Jurisdiction - General Information

Ireland has been a Contracting Party to the Paris Convention for the Protection of Industrial Property since December 4, 1925. It has also been a Contracting Party to the Patent Cooperation Treaty (PCT) since August 1, 1992, but it can be designated only through a European Patent. In addition, it is a party to the Budapest Treaty on the International Recognition of the Deposit of Microorganisms for the Purposes of Patent Procedure and the Patent Law Treaty (PLT).

Ireland is a member of the European Patent Organization (EPO).

Online Patent Register and Online Gazette

Ireland has an Online Register and an Online Gazette.

Features and search functionalities

The Online Register has an **English interface**. It contains information about Irish patents, short-term patents, and European patents.

Through the Online Register you can retrieve information on **Fee Payment**, **Legal Status**, and **Supplementary Protection Certificates (SPCs)**. The patent register can only be searched by application/publication number.

There is also a <u>patent database</u> which allows an advanced search mode by **PCT Publication Number**, by **Applicant/Inventor Name**, and by **Priority Data** (Priority Date or Number, but without country code). Through the patent database, it is also possible to access the **Full Publications** as PDF files, while European Patents designating Ireland can be downloaded through a link to Espacenet.

SPCs can be searched in a separate database available at this link.

The Online Gazette is published every two weeks in English. It is searchable by number and date and can be displayed in HTML and PDF format. The current coverage is from 2002 to present.

European patents designating Ireland can be searched in the patent register or in the <u>European Patent</u> <u>Register</u>.
